UNITED IN ANGER A HISTORY OF ACT UP

UNITED IN ANGER is the first feature-length documentary to explore the history of ACT UP (the AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power)—a dynamic group of men and women who came together in 1987 to try to change the world and save each other's lives. The film documents the planning and execution of some of ACT UP's most famous actions, including Seize Control of the FDA and Stop the Church, which forced the U.S. government and mainstream media to deal with the AIDS crisis. It also reveals the group's complex culture, in which meetings, affinity groups, and debates over civil disobedience mingled with profound grief, anger, sexiness, and energy.
